The Drop off system

I ran this in the last few newsletters (yawn!) and thought it would be good to repeat it again now as it seems to be working but really need to hammer it home to all. So good is it I have decided to make it a permanent page in the newsletter so that any new members and old forgetful ones can read up and brush up before a ride out.

This system has been used to good effect with nearly all members arriving at the same time when on a ride out! The golden rule is that if you are dropped off, in a safe position, to indicate where the group has gone 'DO NOT LEAVE YOUR POST UNTIL THE TAIL END RIDER IN PINK OR SOME OTHER GARISH COLOUR' has gone past you – or motioned you out.

The Drop Off system is very effective at keeping the group on the chosen route as it allows everyone to ride at their own pace, and the ride can spread out over a fair distance without becoming separated. There are just a few simple instructions to follow:

- Each run will have a 'Leader' who always heads the group, and a 'Tailender' who will always be last, both wearing high-viz so they can be easily identified. The rest of the group members take turns as 'Markers' and their position in the group will change throughout the ride.
- At each junction, roundabout or other situation which might cause confusion over the route to be taken, the Leader will signal to the rider immediately behind him/her (the Marker) to pull in and stop at the point of route deviation. The Marker should choose a safe, visible position to park, and use **arm signals** to show the correct route to take, to the following riders.
- The Marker who was 'dropped off' must wait until the Tail-ender arrives before re-joining the group. They must not leave their position until the Tail-ender comes along, however long it takes, otherwise the group will become separated.
- As the Tail-ender approaches he/she will slow down to enable the Marker to pull out. Traffic conditions may make this impossible, particularly on busy roundabouts, in which case he/she will ride past the Marker and allow them to overtake where it is safe to do so.
- If you are the third bike behind the Leader and you realise that the bike in front has not marked a change in direction when signalled to do so by the Leader, **then mark it yourself**.
- <u>TWO GOLDEN RULES, DON'T OVERTAKE THE LEADER AND</u> <u>ALWAYS WAIT FOR TAIL END CHARLIE,</u>

Spanish Caper 2023 - Part 2

21st May 2023, after parting with Bob and Mandy in Caceres with hugs and best wishes all around, our group of six began the 4 night return journey (5 including the ferry) by turning north-east toward Segovia, with a detour to the walled city of Avila.

Avila is surrounded by an 11th century 1.5 mile medieval wall that encircles the entire city and includes over 80 stone towers it was a breath-taking sight as we approached. We explored the 11th Century Cathedral, which is built into the city walls and is Spain's oldest Gothic Cathedral.

After a light lunch at a small cafe in Avila, we rode on to Segovia, dominated by a 95 foot Roman Aqueduct that towers over the city centre. Our hotel (a former monastery) was next to a lower section of the aqueduct and during our two nights in Segovia we regularly walked alongside the structure on our way to and from the main square.

The Roman aqueduct was built with un-mortared granite stones around the 1st century AD, and brought water from springs 11 miles away. We continued to marvel at it's beauty throughout our visit, often while sitting in the square with refreshments or admiring it lit by spotlights at night.

Segovia's Alcazar is a medieval palace/fortress with panoramic views of the city and nearby countryside. Some of us spent a couple of hours here and especially enjoyed the views from the 152 step tower. This picturesque castle is rumoured to be the inspiration for Walt Disney's fairy tale castle.

Mandy and Bob had encouraged us (several times!) to sample Segovia's traditional meal of suckling pig. We thought a small pig might arrive on a platter, so only one of



us was brave enough to place that order at dinner and everyone else ordered

skewers. The waiter seemed to understand the order but must have transposed it, because what arrived was 1 plate of skewers and 5 suckling pigs. Luckily the suckling pig was not the entire animal, only pieces of pork, however some got a leg and some an ear!



There was initially some talk of returning the whole order since it was so spectacularly wrong, but quiet reigned after the unfortunate soul who had the skewers shared samples of them. They were just small dried pieces of over cooked skin that were inedible, while the suckling pig pieces were quite nice, though probably not the authentic experience. We'll try again the next time we're in northern Spain, as the spectacular scenery certainly makes it a place worth visiting again.

Then on to Soria for the night, where we had a steep and winding approach to the hotel high upon a hilltop, but the difficult ascent was rewarded by panoramic views of the Douro River below. We wandered around the ruins of Soria Castle, which was only yards from the hotel, and then ate at the hotel.

On the way to our final night in Spain in Burgos, we stopped at a pleasant small restaurant in Barbadillo del Mercado smelling strongly of garlic. The owner was very friendly and seemed to enjoy our group's visit, but had hoped we would consume more than coffee and ice cream.

Burgos has an impressive city gate near the Cathedral where El Cid is buried under a stone slab. Some of the group rested in the hotel and/or cafes before dinner, while others explored the Cathedral and hiked up the steep hill to the castle ruins overlooking the city. Some sidewalks had the imprint of a shell, marking the pilgrimage route to Santiago de Compostela. While not as interesting as Cacares or Segovia, Burgos has a pleasant main square and preserves the 15th century

building where Christopher Columbus met with the monarchs Ferdinand and Isabella after one of this trips to the Americas.

On the route to Santander the next day, we relaxed at a cafe when a meat van arrived. We watched as large, raw, unwrapped carcasses were carried inside while slung over the delivery men's shoulders.

We expected the run from Burgos into Santander to be mundane, but the N623 we took had miles of stunning mountainous views with fast sweeping bends that were a fantastic ride to end a memorable 10 day, mostly dry, ride in Spain.



Once at the Santander ferry port, we had a long wait in the hot sun before finally boarding with scores of other bikes. The guys worried about the (over) tightness of the securing straps over the seats, and discussed the use of side stand versus main stands. Finally we brought a subset of our already light luggage to our cabin, which was tiny but well designed and certainly adequate for one's night's rest.

We all wandered around the ferry on our final evening together, as well as during the next morning. Everyone ended up in the bar or restaurant at some point, where we would share a drink and a chat before going outside to view the sea, etc.

While the outward bound ferry journey had been completely smooth, the overnight return to Plymouth had a steady up and down pitch, which had a pleasant lulling effect throughout the night.

One of the only negative points from the trip was the unloading of motorbikes from the Brittany ferry. There must have been around a hundred bikes crammed in on the lower deck and were made to wait until all the other vehicles had disembarked. It was a very long, very hot wait and once finally out into daylight a very long queue to get through passport control in Plymouth.

This ride through northern Spain was not only full of stunning scenery, it was also a pleasure to spend time with this group of people. The variety of characters led to lots of laughter and to many hours of shared enjoyment. It was a special trip. Many



thanks to Mandy & Bob for organising the route and hotels and to Jeff Pope (Ex Devon NOC) for finding so many scenic roads. **Paul & Julia Davies**

Highlight for me was a comfort stop at Steeple Langford truck stop on the A36, egg and sausage doorstep 'par excellence' $\pounds 5 + \pounds 1$ for tea, see front cover for the photo. We WILL be visiting again (3).

A very nice meeting some 57 Norton's of all shapes and sizes. On the way home I had a puncture, shock horror! Luckily Alan had a tubeless tyre repair and Carole had her electric pump for inflation.

Modus operandi as follows,

Remove nail, then using a reaming tool with a bit of lubrication clean out the hole, To help insertion the tyre has to be inflated, to aid insertion of the plug further lubrication is applied. A good hard thrust of the plug insertion tool positioned the plug followed by careful withdrawal of the tool setting said plug into position.

Carole's inflator was key to the operation, without it the tyre would have been too soft and plug insertion more difficult, with plug inserted and the repair finished with the slash of a blade the excess bung is circumcised. All done within 15 minutes. Don't you just love tubeless tyres (a), if it was a tubed tyre I would still be in the layby awaiting recovery (a). Post script tyre is still fully inflated 2 weeks later.

Keith Boulton's Tips Of The Day

May 2024

1. Using old inner tubes. You can make a useful tool bag from an old inner tube. Make two cuts of your chosen size, first cut straight across and the second cut shape to form a flap. Stick and or sew as necessary to make a pouch, then pop in tools and tuck in the flap..

2. Magneto-auto advance units. The auto advance unit fits on to a taper. I have found that it can wear when the unit presses onto the seal on the magneto, consequently making it loosen and slip and upsettg the timing. You can solve this problem by taking a small amount from the back of the auto advance unit with a file to reset the taper.

3. Carburettors. When fitting carburettor hoses a light dusting of talcum powder enables a much easier fit.
